Chapter 5: Family Care

The family bears the entire responsibility for taking care of the elderly person—either in the senior's home or in the home of the family member.

Advantages

- Fulfills the "promise of home"
- Opportunities for close personal relationship with your senior
- Low cost of care (primarily out-of-pocket)
- Great personal satisfaction
- Intergenerational bonding

Disadvantages

- Risk of high personal and family stress
- Potential for multigenerational conflicts
- Possibility of under serving the needs of your senior
- Neglecting your own family
- Loss of productivity on your job

Choose This Option If

- senior is functional on all activities of daily living (ADL)
- limited assistance is required by senior

Average Annual Cost

- An estimated \$5,000 to \$8,000 in out-of-pocket expenses to provide care, including transportation, meals, etc., but depends on the care situation
